Strategic Plan, Volunteers Lead the Way

Metro Parks has aggressively explored this challenge in the development of the first ever agency strategic plan outlining our goals, purposes and plans for the future.

The Strategic Parks and Program Services Plan guides us as we make policy decisions that enhance livability of Tacoma and Pierce County. It fosters a parks and recreation system that is sustainable and integrated, fair and equitable, accessible and inclusive of all members of the community. Our vision is that residents will be served effectively and efficiently, through our stewardship of environmental, educational, and cultural resources. The Plan helps keep Metro Parks focused on mission-led businesses and programs.

An important outcome from the strategic planning process was the classification of all our parks into categories that guide decisions such as: future design, capital investments or improvements, maintenance/ operations and appropriate programming/uses.

Understanding a park classification will help you know what to expect and gives volunteers an idea of the needs that exist. All parks, regardless of size, type, location and needs, rely on the dedication and expertise of our parks, open space, greenhouse and garden club volunteers.

Conservatory Manager Mary Anderson is thankful for the many volunteers who made the Chihuly at Seymour 100 exhibition an overwhelming success, "Our volunteers are a very dedicated group and we're so thankful for them," she shares.

The exhibit, which was the finale in a year long celebration of the conservatory's centennial, kicked off with a Grand Opening Gala led by volunteer Chair Benjii Bittle. "His help and connections not only on the gala, but with the Chihuly exhibit were invaluable," Anderson said. Volunteer Michelle Regan did double duty serving on the centennial committee and as gala treasurer. The volunteer members of the Seymour Conservatory Foundation Board also provided support for the event.

Others like Michael Greenwood and Charlie Askins served as extra eyes and ears for artwork security while educating visitors about the glass and plants. "Volunteers were vital to enable staff to accomplish the many tasks involved with daily operations at the conservatory and to be able to take breaks and lunches, as we were experiencing a 250% increase in attendance from the prior year," adds Anderson.
