After countless volunteer hours, the GTP developed an open space plan outlining policies for acquisition, restoration and management of natural areas. The City of Tacoma adopted the policies as the Open Space Habitat and Recreation component of their Comprehensive Plan and the Cascade Land Conservancy provided a grant for a full-time GTP coordinator to put the policies into action.

The Green Tacoma Partnership is a public-private partnership between Metro Parks, the City of Tacoma, Tahoma Audubon Society, Cascade Land Conservancy, other local environmental groups, neighborhood groups, educational and service organizations, local businesses and volunteers like you that will turn the Open Space Habitat and Recreation goals into reality.
